Parent Survey (Spring 1st)

Thank you to the forty parents who shared their feedback. Please see below for some key headlines from the feedback. We asked our parents to comment on our new 'Look and Learn' parent sessions, comment on the school newsletter as well as clubs for our children. Forty parents participated in the survey. 97% of our parents shared that the newsletter had improved communication at our school. 88% of our parents shared that the 'Look and Learn' sessions have been helpful. Suggestions from our parents have been:

- A weekly email, rather than several in a week (we are looking into this)
- Short blog about the staff at our school (we will commence this in the summer term)
- Offer a range of subjects for 'Look and Learn' (this is already planned)
- The session for 'Look and Learn' to be a whole lesson, rather than 25 minutes (we will continue with the 25-minute sessions, but instead will offer weekly Zooms on key teaching and learning aspects)
- Low take-up on clubs linked to expense as well as the range of clubs offered
- Parents would like to see these clubs in school: art, foreign languages, drama, various dance, computing

Operation Encompass

Operation Encompass is a national scheme that operates jointly between schools and all police forces. Children who live in homes where there is domestic abuse, or who experience domestic abuse in their own teenage relationships, can be negatively impacted by this experience.

Operation Encompass means that our school will be told, prior to the start of the next school day, when police have attended an incident of domestic abuse where there is a child or young person who attends our school who is related to any of those involved in the incident.

Most of the DSLs at school are trained. This allows us to use the information that has been confidentially shared with us by the police, to understand how a child may be impacted by domestic abuse and to then offer support to the child/ren in our care.

Cybersecurity

What is the meaning of phishing, smishing, vishing and quishing?

Phishing - a malicious email encouraging you to click on a link with the aim of collecting your details or downloading malicious code.

Smishing - a text message (SMS) to encouraging you to click on a link with the aim of collecting your details or transferring you to a fake website.

Vishing - an unsolicited telephone call to collect your details or defraud you.

Quishing - a fake QR code diverting you to a fake website or some other fraudulent link.

Welfare News

Is your child well enough to be at school?

We are still experiencing high levels of illness at school, such as coughs, colds, sore throats and fever to name a few. This is very normal for this time of year, but if you are unsure whether your child should be at school, to help you decide, please use this [LINK](#)

Oral Hygiene

Tooth decay is largely preventable, but it's still a serious problem among young children. The Office for Health Improvement and Disparities oral health survey of 5 year old children 2022 and Public Health England oral health survey of 3 year old children 2020 found that:

- nearly a quarter of 5 year olds in England have tooth decay, affecting 3 to 4 teeth on average
- children from more deprived backgrounds are more likely to have tooth decay
- 11% of 3 year olds in England have visible tooth decay, affecting 3 teeth on average

Having decayed teeth removed is also the most common reason for surgery under a general anaesthetic for children aged 6 to 10.
